



Arkansas Duckmasters Hunting & Lodging List

Before You Arrive...

- **Duck Hunting License.** Visit AGFC.com or call 1-800-364-GAME to request a 5-Day Waterfowl Hunting Permit & an Arkansas HIP Card (**NOTE:** You'll need a HIP card even if you already have one from your home state). You'll also need an Arkansas duck stamp, which you can get with your permit, and a federal duck stamp, which you can get along with your license.
- **Directions & Transportation.** We're located at [264 Looney Ln, Proctor, Arkansas 72376](#). Transportation from Memphis International Airport is also available. Call Chrissy at 870.735.4030 to make arrangements.
- **Check-In.** Check-in is as early as 3:00pm.

While You're Here...

- **Rooms.** You'll be staying in a room with your group. There are 6 beds per room (4 queens & 2 twins). Groups over 6 will have multiple rooms. All linens & towels are provided throughout your stay. Alarm clocks are available in each room.
- **Gear.** Gear you bring with you may be kept in your room, or placed in the "mud room" area, whichever you prefer.
- **Dogs.** If you're bringing your four-legged friend, we have a kennel available, or a crate that may be kept in the mud room. We ask that they not be left unattended at any time in the bunk rooms (we've been down this road before and it's not pretty).
- **Game Room.** The game room is available throughout your stay for pool, poker, and whatever else you may find in there.
- **Breakfast.** Light breakfast & snacks for your blind bag are available in the common kitchen to grab before your hunt departure.
- **Brunch.** Brunch is served in the dining room after you return from your morning hunt.
- **Appetizers & Supper.** Apps will be served in the bar at 5:00pm. Supper is served in the dining room at 6:30pm.
- **Refreshments.** Cokes, tea & other refreshments are available in the bar area throughout your stay.
- **Hunt Times.** Groups & departures will be posted after dinner. Times set are based on shooting hours, so make sure you set those alarm clocks and you're ready to roll at your set departure time.
- **Transportation.** You will be transported by your guide in one of our vehicles.
- **Check-Out.** You'll settle up with us following brunch on your check-out date.



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Packing List...

- **Insulated Chest Waders** (*Available for Rent*) While some hunters stick with hip boots, chest waders are your best bet.
- **Insulated Waterproof Jacket.** Because it's cold & wet out there.
- **Camo.** We recommend straw-colored camo for your upper body—Shadow Grass and Breakup are two popular & versatile patterns (**NOTE:** Avoid green camo, as it makes you stand out).
- **Base Layer & Socks.** Be sure you pack plenty of wool or thermal socks and long underwear for your base layer.
- **Headgear & Facemask.** Don't forget warm headgear and a full-face, straw-colored camo mask. A hunter's face sends a strong "danger" signal to the ducks (no matter how pretty you are).
- **Waterproof Gloves.** We recommend gore-tex or thinsulate water-resistant gloves.
- **Hand/Boot Warmers.** We'll have some, but you can never have too many.
- **Shotgun** (*Available for Rent*) A 12-gauge is standard for waterfowl, but you might prefer a 20-gauge. Bring one or two guns you're comfortable shooting.
- **Choke Tube.** Consider bringing cylinder or modified choke tubes.
- **Ammo.** Bring two boxes of 25 shells for each day of hunting. We recommend Steel Shot #2 Shells (**NOTE:** No lead is allowed for duck hunting).
- **Duck Calls.** Our guides are excellent duck callers, but you're welcome to bring your favorite duck calls and join in.
- **Gun Slings & Game Straps.** Trust us, when you leave the blind with the limit of ducks, you'll be glad to have a gun sling and some game straps to help you carry the load.
- **Flashlight.** A small flashlight helps with visibility on your way to the blind before sunrise.
- **Chapstick.** Because needing it and not having it is the worst.
- **Sunglasses.** Polarized lenses are helpful for dealing with any glare from the water.
- **Ear Plugs.** For the sake of your hearing, consider bringing ear plugs.
- **Blind Bag.** To carry all your hunting stuff (we don't have a sherpa on staff).
- **Camera.** We guarantee some picture-worthy moments on your trip. Given the conditions, you might prefer a disposable camera if you want to snap some shots without risking a frigid morning swim.
- **Towels.** We supply bath towels at the lodge, but it's never a bad idea to bring a few for your hunt.
- **Toiletries.** We supply soap & toilet paper at the lodge. If you want moisturizer & mousse, you're on your own. You'll also want a toothbrush, toothpaste, shaving gear, shampoo, and deodorant.
